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In the Field

Songbird diversity in backyards and area parks should increase significantly this month as more and more southbound warblers, including Northern Parulas and American Redstarts, make their first Fall appearance in our parts. August birding is also consistently productive in the agricultural areas of southern Miami-Dade and western Palm Beach counties. Flooded fields usually attract large numbers of wading birds, such as the Roseate Spoonbill, and migrant shorebirds, including American Avocet, Pectoral and Stilt Sandpiper and Wilson's Phalarope.

Local Birding Field Trips will resume next month, with the first outing to the <u>Everglades Agricultural Area</u> slated for Saturday, September 2.

City of Miami moves to Protect Pelican Nesting Habitat



The City of Miami Commission unanimously passed a directive on July 13 to collaborate with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to protect what is believed to be a newly forming rookery on "Picnic Island" (located in Biscayne Bay off of Morningside Park). TAS and other local conservation groups played a role in helping secure the city's favorable decision. (<u>Read our letter to Commissioner Sabina Covo here</u>.)

At least seven Brown Pelicans have been documented nesting on Picnic Island by Christopher Boykin, executive director of Pelican Harbor Seabird Station. The Brown Pelican (*Pelecanus occidentalis*) is currently under protection by the U.S. <u>Migratory Bird</u>

Treaty Act.

The Conservation Community is deeply grateful to Commissioner Covo for introducing this item to her colleagues, and convincing them that protecting this nesting site is imperative.

Chirping About

500+ bird species encountered on Kenya Birding Tour



Birders who took the May 13-28 Kenya trip led by TAS field trip leader Luis Gonzalez were richly rewarded: 504 bird species were encountered (495 spotted, 9 heard) — with many providing amazing views. Highlights include the Somali Ostrich, Long-crested Eagle, Ross's and Great Blue Turaco, Jameson's Wattle-Eye, Jackson's Widowbird and Yellow-crowned Bishop. The group also spotted 47 mammal species, including Kirk's Dik-dik, Reticulated Giraffe, African Bush Elephant, Leopard and Cheetah.

Habitats canvassed included the highlands of Aberdare National Park, the dry country of Samburu National Reserve and the rainforests of Kakamega Forest Reserve, as well as the Maasai Mara, where participants visited the northern edge of the largest protected savanna ecosystem in East Africa. <u>Click HERE</u> to read the entire trip report.

Plus, just about anyone of any age can appreciate and learn about birds from their kitchen window, or just by walking around their block."
