## In the Field

#### Happy 4th of July!

The majestic <u>Bald Eagle</u>, emblem bird of the United States, is a year-round Florida resident. In serious decline during much of the 20th century, this raptor has made a comeback in many areas since the 1970s. A powerful predator at times, it is not always so

majestic in its habits: it often feeds on carrion, including dead fish washed up on shore, and it steals food from Ospreys and other smaller birds. It is typically found close to water where prey is abundant.

#### Share the Shore to help Shorebirds Survive & Thrive!

- Give nesting birds plenty of space. Signs or volunteers usually alert us to nesting areas.
- Where pets are allowed on beaches, keep them leashed, away from birds and off dunes.
- Remove trash and food scraps, which attract foraging animals and potential predators.
- Stay on marked pathways, and do not traverse beach dunes or other nesting areas.

Regularly scheduled birding field trips will resume in September. Share your bird sightings on our <u>Bird Board</u> and <u>Facebook Bird Board</u>.

#### **Shorebird Stewards Needed Now!**

A colony of <u>Least Terns</u> have returned to nest at the Mayan Dune, a historic Ft. Lauderdale nesting site for the small seabirds who winter on South America's northern shores. The Least Tern is listed as "Threatened" in Florida and is a federally protected seabird. *Stewards are needed immediately* to help protect these birds and their chicks, and to better educate the public. The site has been marked off by the State Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to protect the estimated 200 terns and their 70+/-nests. Volunteer stewards are most needed for shifts of two hours or more, primarily 6-9 a.m. and/or 6-10 p.m. To participate, please call Ann Wiley at 954.805.3355.



### Pernod Ricard volunteers brave heat to beautify SNC grounds!



More than 70 <u>Pernod Ricard</u> employees braved heat and mosquitoes to contribute their time, energy and sweat equity to Tropical Audubon Society on a recent June morning. ### Healthy Habitat for Happy Birds





The BIRDS Thank ... **Gene Sherwood of Green Wise Group,** who volunteered his esteemed Arboricultural Management service to help steward our 2.2-acre Steinberg Nature Center grounds. Gene is graciously filling the void left by tree surgeon and former Advisory Board member Mark Howell, who recently moved upstate.

Along with helping Grounds Director Amy Creekmur with strategic pruning of our native canopy and removal of potential "widow-makers" (dangerous dead limbs that can drop unexpectedly), Gene's company also provides all-natural untreated mulch to assist in protecting tree roots, nurturing soil, moisture retention and tamping down invasive weeds. Additionally, the ISA Certified Arborist was voted onto the Advisory Board at the annual Members Migration meeting on April 30.

Gene is no stranger to the neighborhood. The Miami native and Redland resident serves as the official Arborist at the University of Miami's highly regarded Gifford Arboretum, which, like Tropical Audubon's Steinberg Nature Center, is considered a "green island" by both birds and biologists. Green islands are essential in an urban landscape where habitat required by birds and other wildlife is sparse due to development. Because of their size and near proximity to each other, these two green islands serve crucial roles, and the birds appreciate the short flight between both sites.

Gene is a passionate and knowledgeable steward of our community's natural landscape who cares deeply about nurturing hospitable habitat for wildlife. He has been trimming

trees locally for 30+ years, initially as the owner-operator of Sherwood Forest Tree Service from 1991-2007. He and his wife, Jeanne, founded <u>Green Wise Group</u> in 2009; their arboricultural services include tree and palm trimming, tree removal, stump grinding, arborist inspections, landscape planning and more.
