Attention Beachgoers!

When we're at the beach this summer, let's remember to share the sand with the shorebirds who nest in our area at this time of year — specifically, the Wilson's Plover, Least Tern and Black Skimmer. Helping these beach denizens safely hatch and raise their

chicks is deeply meaningful, and a captivating teaching opportunity for kids.

Tips to help Shorebirds Survive & Thrive!

- Give nesting birds plenty of space. Signs or volunteers usually alert us to nesting areas.
- Where pets are allowed on beaches, keep them leashed, away from birds and off dunes.
- Remove trash and food scraps, which attract foraging animals and potential predators.
- Stay on marked pathways, and do not traverse beach dunes or other nesting areas.

Shorebird Stewards Needed Now!

A colony of <u>Least Terns</u> have returned to nest at the Mayan Dune, a historic Ft. Lauderdale nesting site for the small seabirds who winter on South America's northern shores. The Least Tern is listed as "Threatened" in Florida and is a federally protected seabird. *Stewards are needed immediately* to help protect these birds and their tiny chicks, and to better educate the public. The site has been marked off by the State Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to protect the estimated 200 terns and their 70+/- nests. Volunteer stewards are most needed for shifts of two hours or more, primarily 6-9 a.m. and/or 6-10 p.m. To participate, please call Ann Wiley at 954.805.3355.

Endangered Miami Tiger Beetle wins critical Habitat victory, but defeating Theme Park development remains crucial



Following a hard-won legal victory achieved by TAS in partnership with the Center for Biological Diversity and Miami Blue Chapter of the North American Butterfly Association, on May 22 the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service designated 1,869 acres of lifesaving critical habitat for the endangered Miami tiger beetle in Miami-Dade County. The beetle currently survives in only two isolated populations, separated by urban development.

In its federal notice, the Service emphasized that the Miami tiger beetle will need to have additional populations if it is going to recover and emphasized the importance of the beetle's last remaining habitat in the Richmond Pine Rocklands, noting that it contains biological features the beetle needs to survive.

Although the Service's decision protects remnant pine rockland habitat, the beetle and its habitat are threatened by imminent development in Miami-Dade County. The proposed Miami Wilds water park and retail development plans to bring a 27.5-acre water park, retail area, hotel and dozens of acres of associated parking lots to the area. Development threatens to cause cascading effects on imperiled species, including the Miami tiger beetle, and to surrounding ecosystems.

TAS Senior Conservation Director Lauren Jonaitis is happy to see that the Service finally designated critical habitat for the Miami tiger beetle, which is key to the survival of this highly endangered species, but she says "we still have a fight on our hands." Why? Because, according to Jonaitis, if the proposed Miami Wilds waterpark and retail development is built adjacent to Zoo Miami it will irrevocably harm the beetle and other endangered species, including the Florida bonneted bat and Bartram's scrub-hairstreak butterfly. All three depend on the undeveloped Pine Rockland habitat. "To ensure these integral native species recover, we'll need another victory to save this rare remnant of their crucial habitat from the bulldozers," Jonaitis warns.

Cape Florida Banding Station wraps up Spring Migration Season



Cape Florida Banding Station (CFBS) concluded its 2023 Spring Migration season on May 15 with 1,310 birds of 32 species banded, 33 of which were return visitors from previous seasons. While spring activity started off quietly due to wind patterns, the first half of May yielded an excellent movement of birds, and the Station had its busiest day ever with 230 birds banded on May 3! Over the course of the Spring season, a record 10 Veery and 21 Swainson's Warblers were encountered with 2 overwintering Swainson's Warblers originally banded during the record Fall 2022 Swainson's Warbler season. CFBS Director Michelle Davis says, "It's gratifying to see this secretive and unique warbler species in greater numbers here over recent years."
