**In the Field**

---

October heralds our region's last big flush of fall migrants. First-of-season songbirds, such as the Rose-breasted Grosbeak, appear now, and several of our wintering species typically begin arriving too, including Eastern Phoebe and Black-throated Green Warbler. The Ruby-throated Hummingbird and Painted Bunting (*pictured*) also brighten our landscape now. There is an excellent chance of spotting vagrants, such as the Thick-billed Vireo, at this time of year as well. Check Tropical Audubon's [Rare Bird Update](#) for the latest sightings.

# LIGHTS OUT MIAMI

**Save Migrating Birds**

**Turn OFF lights 11pm to 6am, Aug 15 - Nov 15**

Fall Migration is in full swing this month and into early November as millions of birds heading south for the winter pass through South Florida. Because migrating birds generally rest and forage during the day and travel at night using the stars as navigational

aids, brightly lit cities impede their night vision, steer them off course, and can confuse and disorient them, often causing deadly collisions. Sadly, millions of birds are lost to building collisions in the U.S. each year.

To lower the mortality rate, TAS's *[Light's Out Miami](#)* initiative urges homeowners and building managers to turn off or block non-essential lights from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. through November 15 to protect migratory birds traveling through our region.

**Bird Collision Data Collection volunteers are urgently needed to search for birds who have been injured or killed by colliding with buildings.** Data collected anywhere in Miami-Dade County is of value, but most needed are volunteers to monitor the Brickell, Downtown and Biscayne Boulevard corridor, as well as areas such as Aventura, Coconut Grove and Coral Gables business districts, Downtown Dadeland, Miami Beach and any other communities with a concentration of tall buildings where collisions are highly likely.

## Behind the Scenes at the Cape Florida Banding Station – 20 years of Community Science



October 5 marks the 20th Anniversary of the Cape Florida Banding Station (CFBS)! How did a one-person operation evolve into one of the longest-running community science projects in Florida? You'll find out in this lively exploration of the CFBS (under the TAS wing since 2020) at Bill Baggs Cape Florida State Park. Hear station cofounder Michelle

Davis retrace the project's trajectory, share what scientists learn from the long-term data collected by Banding Station volunteers, and explain how such data helps birds survive.

Davis celebrates the dedicated volunteers who've made this project possible, recounts the most interesting birds encountered over 20 years, including a Ruddy Quail Dove banded on October 3, 2013 — the rarest bird ever encountered at the station and the only one banded in the Continental U.S. — and discusses the Station's role as a flagship TAS program.

MDC Blocks UDB Expansion *again*,

but Developer gets yet another chance!

Next Vote on "Logistics District" October 18



We are grateful to the hundreds of Tropical Audubon Society (TAS) members who urged

MDC Commissioners to deny the South Dade Logistics District (SDLT), but the fight isn't over.

On Thursday, September 22, the Miami-Dade County (MDC) Board of County Commissioners (BCC) again blocked an application to expand the Urban Development Boundary (UDC) on agricultural areas near Biscayne Bay to accommodate an industrial development. After much debate, thankfully, [the application](#) to expand the UDB did not secure the 8 votes needed for approval.

Unbelievably, the developer gets yet another chance to bring this ill-conceived proposal before the BCC on October 18!

Why does this vote continue to get deferred? Because none of the three votes taken to date garnered an 8-vote majority needed to deny or approve the application.



**The Birds Thank ...** the countless volunteers who have donated their time, talents and skills to the Cape Florida Banding Station (CFBS) over the past two decades. The Station, which celebrates its 20th anniversary this month, relies on volunteers to assist with banding operations in the Spring and Fall migration seasons. These generous individuals receive training in how to gently untangle mist-netted songbirds and handle them with care. They also learn about species identification, sexing and aging techniques. In turn, they commit to volunteering at least one day per week during each banding season. Thanks to their dedication, CFBS — under the TAS wing since 2020 — is one of the longest-running community science projects in South Florida.

Located at Bill Baggs Cape Florida State Park, the Station gathers data that helps scientists understand songbird migration patterns, underscores the importance of the park's restored native hardwood hammock to these migrants, and informs researchers, the public and civic leaders.
