Protect Endangered Species & imperiled Pine Rocklands habitat from Theme Park development!

On September 6, the Miami Dade County Board of County Commissioners (MDC BCC) will be voting on whether to extend the lease agreement for a 67-acre theme park, hotel and retail development misleadingly dubbed "Miami Wilds." The development site is on Zoo Miami property — land that is considered vital to endangered species and the largest and most biodiverse fragment of critically endangered Pine Rocklands outside of Everglades National Park.

Take Action!

ATTEND the MDC BCC meeting on September 6 and voice your opposition to Miami Wilds development! The meeting begins at 9:30am at the Stephen P. Clark Government Center (address: 111 NW 1st St, Miami, FL 33132, 2nd floor Commission Chambers). We recommend that you arrive early and bring your ID for check-in.

Fall Migration Fundraiser to benefit
Cape Florida Banding Station field work



Support crucial migratory bird research and help educate the next generation of local conservationists by participating in the "Adopt-A-Net" Fall Migration fundraising campaign to benefit the Cape Florida Banding Station (CFBS), a 21-year-old community science program partnering with Tropical Audubon Society since 2020!

The field research conducted by CFBS and its team of skilled volunteers illuminates the importance of protecting native habitat for migrating songbirds, especially within Miami-Dade County's urban core. The "Adopt-A-Net" effort provides MDC residents with the opportunity to help replace worn "mist nets" and fund other needs that are integral to CFBS operations.

Fall 2023 also marks the promotion of volunteers Nasim Mahomar and Nicole Rita to the positions of co-coordinators overseeing the daily CFBS field operations.

Lights Out Miami!

Bird Collision Data Collectors needed



Fall Migration is at its peak this month and continues into early November as millions of birds heading south for the winter pass through South Florida. Because migrating birds generally rest and forage during the day and travel at night using the stars as navigational aids, brightly lit cities impede their night vision, steer them off course, and can confuse and disorient them, often causing deadly collisions. Sadly, millions of birds are lost to building collisions in the U.S. every year.

To lower the mortality rate and protect migratory birds traveling through our region, TAS's <u>Light's Out Miami</u> initiative urges homeowners and building managers to turn off or block non-essential lights from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. through November 15 to protect

migratory birds traveling through our region.

Bird Collision Data Collection volunteers are urgently needed to search for birds who have been injured or killed by colliding with buildings. Data collected anywhere in Miami-Dade County is of value, but most needed are volunteers to monitor the Brickell, Downtown and Biscayne Boulevard corridor, as well as areas such as Aventura, Coconut Grove and Coral Gables business districts, Downtown Dadeland, Miami Beach and any other communities with a concentration of tall buildings where collisions are highly likely.

Visit Florida Keys Hawkwatch thru October 31



<u>Florida Keys Hawkwatch</u> (FKH) is dedicated to promoting the appreciation and conservation of birds by committing to the long-term study of their migration through the Florida Keys. Visitors are welcome, weather permitting, 9am-4pm through October 31. Location: Bathhouse in the campground of Curry Hammock State Park just north of

Marathon (56200 Overseas Hwy).

For the first time in the count's history, the project is being operated this year by an all-women team comprised of Mariah Hryniewich, who, in her fourth season at FKH, has been joined by Gianna Acuri as primary counters.

In another first, FKH also announced that with the help of generous donations from the birding community, digital hardware was purchased that will make it possible to record data on Trektellen.org, the world's largest migration repository.
